It is our pleasure to bring you the 2023 Taranaki Foundation Impact Report.

Our mission at Taranaki Foundation is to grow giving and philanthropy by matching generous people with our region's important community causes. In the past year, we've made substantial progress towards this goal, thanks to our growing family of donors and supporters.

We are focused on growing our endowment fund to enable us to provide more grants to help those voluntary groups and charities that are making a big difference to the well-being of our local community. Every gift, large or small, forms a part of our story and the impact we have today, tomorrow and for generations to come.

Taranaki Foundation continued to grow in the 2022 financial year, despite the current global economic challenges and adverse market conditions that impacted investment returns. To the end of 30 June 2023 endowment funds under management have grown to \$3.28m, up from \$2.05m in 2022.

Since 2016, nearly \$750,000 has been distributed to worthy causes in Taranaki, thanks to the generosity of our Taranaki donors and The Tindall Foundation. This year, 114 grants totalling \$221,287 were awarded across our various funding streams. Committed bequests in Wills have risen to \$7.2m from \$5m in 2022.

Together with local partners, including Ngāti Te Whiti, NP Partners and NPDC, Destination Play at Kāwaroa has secured the \$5 million needed for the first stage. We owe this achievement to the generous support from funders, individuals, families and local businesses.

We recognise Community Foundations New Zealand (CFNZ) for their support. We are proud to be one of 17 Community Foundations across Aotearoa New Zealand growing funds and long-term community impact. Over \$60 million has been granted to local communities in the past 5 years and an incredible \$240 million is managed across the network.

We're thankful to Ken Horner and Paul Goldsmith, the founding co-chairs and trustees, for their impactful role in shaping the Taranaki Foundation. As they retire from the Board, we're honoured that Ken has become the Foundation's first Patron.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all those contributing to the growth and expansion of the Foundation. Whether you are a donor, supporter, funding partner, grant recipient, professional advisor or community leader, you have all played a significant role in our journey.

Together, we are creating a more prosperous Taranaki for all.

ESTABLISHED COMMUNITY FUNDS

Taranaki is full of amazing people making incredible things happen. The following groups have established Community Funds managed by Taranaki Foundation.

Any donation made to a Community Fund will be invested, protected, and grown, with a focus on building an endowment that will continue to support local groups for generations to come.

Coach McKean Fund

Created to honour Coach McKean and to benefit 'The Future Champions Programme' as well as promising Taranaki young athletes of secondary school age.

Conductive Education Fund

Dedicated to providing the opportunity for each child to maximise their abilities for generations to come.

East Taranaki Environment Collective Fund

Committed to supporting a place for our native taonga —Kiwi, Kokako, Long-tailed bats and other native species — to thrive.

Friends of New Plymouth Opera House Fund

In 2022 this Fund was transferred to the Foundation so that the excellent work they have undertaken for many years is continued in perpetuity.

Hāwera High School Fund

Established in 2019 for the benefit and welfare of the education, learning, cultural and/or sporting activities at the school.

Help a Taranaki Child Trust Fund

Established to continue the original trust vision and purpose of helping disadvantaged children.

Hospice Taranaki Fund

Hospice Taranaki has partnered with the Taranaki Foundation to provide a pathway for bequest funding to help build financial security and sustainability.

New Plymouth Girls' High School Fund

Established to support the vision and delivery of education at NPGHS.

New Plymouth Riding for the Disabled Fund

Established to support sustainable funding for the therapeutic, educational, and recreational horse-riding services they provide.

Puke Ariki Fund

This Fund aims to provide long term funding for the sustainability of the museum, library and visitor centre.

Taranaki Foundation Fund

A general fund, established by Taranaki Foundation to assist with current, urgent funding needs across the community.

Taranaki Retreat Legacy Fund

Supporting the life-saving support the Retreat provides and aiming to build financial security and confidence for the future.

The Swingiest Fund for Generations of Art Lovers

This Fund was established by the Friends of the Gallery to ensure ongoing support for the Govett-Brewster and its collections, exhibitions, and events.

Taranaki Youth Boost Fund

Established in 2022 with the aim of scaling up the impact of Youth Boost to reach more deserving students across Taranaki.

Waitara High School Fund

Established to support the vision and delivery of education at Waitara High School.



ESTABLISHED ORGANISATION FUNDS

These funds are established by organisations in partnership with Taranaki Foundation, to strategically manage their giving, amplify their impact and achieve their community-orientated philanthropic objectives

Connect Legal Taranaki Fund

In 2016 this Fund was set up to more carefully plan and structure their community giving now and into the future.

Craigs, New Plymouth

Since 2019, Craigs have supported the Taranaki community through a partnership with Taranaki Foundation by annually directing money to local charities instead of sending out Christmas gifts.

Energyworks Fund

In 2021 Energyworks set up their fund to manage all their smaller local sponsorships and donations with a focus on children, youth, health and wellbeing.

G.J. Gardner Homes Taranaki Fund

A corporate pass-through Fund whose purpose is to provide community benefit.

Liquigas Limited Endowment Fund

Established to support corporate charitable giving and build a fund specifically ear marked for the communities Liquigas operate in across New Zealand.

Donor-Advised Memorial Fund The Taranaki Hauora Fund

When Kelvin Squire joined the Foundation as a trustee in 2016. He never dreamt that two years later he and his wife Carolyn would be establishing the Taranaki Hauora Fund in memory of their son, Leon, who passed away at 43 in 2017.

Creating a legacy for their whanāu (family) and potentially inspiring others, Kelvin explains, "Establishing a fund in Leon's memory creates a legacy for our whanāu and will hopefully make a difference to others by opening the door to what's possible," says Kelvin.

At the heart of the Fund lies creativity, with flexibility to support the hauora (wellbeing) of rangatahi (young people). Kelvin reflects:

"My father instilled in me the notion that we should try to leave the planet better than we found it – a lasting legacy."

The Squires are low-key people who don't seek attention, but they enjoy giving back to their community in memory of their son.

Over the past year, the Taranaki Hauora Fund has enabled the following grants: \$3,000 to Percy Thomson Gallery for technical equipment; \$5,000 to the Stratford Shakespeare Trust; \$2,000 to Stratford Community House, and \$10,000 for sponsorship of the biennial Emergence Art Awards at Percy Thomson Gallery.



Bruce Carter Fund

In 2021, Bruce established a Fund with Taranaki Foundation to continue to support the causes and charities he is passionate about in a strategic and meaningful way.

"I don't have to worry about the day-to-day management of giving. I really like the idea of a personal endowment fund that is invested and will go on giving. For me, it is the best way to give to my chosen causes for the long-term."

Stratford-born, he has always donated to charities, but only started building up a substantial list when he moved home from Australia to New Plymouth nine years ago.

Bruce's philanthropic focus has been on supporting organisations helping others in need, particularly those that help people suffering hardship and local sporting bodies he has been involved with in Taranaki.

The 81-year-old has set up an endowment fund which will see donations continue flowing to the chosen organisations he currently supports and will continue until well after he has passed.

"I'm very passionate about the ones I give to. I just want to keep on giving to them while I'm able to."

Horses Helping Humans

Harnessing Equine Healing

For community organisations, small grants can be transformative – they might mean covering the rent, enhancing services or realising ambitious aspirations.

In November 2022, Horses Helping Humans, Hōiho Hāpai Hapori, received a \$1,000 grant through the Terry & Angela Boon Fund during our annual funding cycle. Additionally, a \$1,375 donation came through the Christmas Giving programme, established by Craigs Investment Partners in New Plymouth through Taranaki Foundation.

Horses Helping Humans Taranaki is an equine-assisted learning programme that empowers vulnerable rangatahi with tools to manage anxiety, aggression, and low self-confidence. This interaction with horses teaches how to modulate body language and breathing, improving emotional regulation, assertiveness and self-assurance.

Collaborating with schools and youth agencies across Taranaki, Horses Helping Humans tailors the programme to cater to individual needs. It has expanded to accommodate young people aged 7 to 18 years and those with high-needs neurodiversity. In 2023, funding for 109 tamariki/rangatahi has enabled them to participate in the programme at no cost.

Laura Menzies, Lead Facilitator, expressed her gratitude, stating, "The funds we received from Taranaki Foundation and from Craigs contributed towards a significant portion of our annual hay bill. We are blown away by everyone's kindness and generosity. It certainly took a huge load off us knowing that our hay was getting cut the following month and we had the funds set aside to cover its cost."



Community Grant

Taranaki Retreat - Waimanako: The Hope Centre

A gathering place to connect, uplift, and empower our community

In December 2021, Waimanako/The Hope Centre opened its doors, offering accessible support for those grappling with personal challenges. However, Jamie emphasises that everyone is welcome to this café-like haven, where a nourishing meal and fine coffee are available for koha. Since inception, over 10,000 whanau have sought refuge in this nurturing space.

"Some seek a sympathetic ear from our trained peer-support workers – it might be about work, loss, relationships, addiction or other challenges. Others come for workshops, support groups, meetings, friendly chats, study sessions or simply a great coffee or meal in a warm setting."

The centre sought funds for a late-shift supervisor's salary support. Taranaki Foundation recognised the great need they were facing and was able to provide a substantial \$14,500 donation from the Tindall Foundation during our annual funding cycle.

Taranaki Retreat's Waimanako serves as more than a sanctuary; it's a beacon of hope and community solidarity.
