A Year of Connection and Impact

Tēnā koutou katoa,

It is our pleasure to bring you the 2023-2024 Taranaki Foundation Impact Report.

Significant change, growth, and new opportunities have defined this year here at the Foundation; centered around Whanaungatanga—connecting and nurturing relationships to empower stronger communities through impactful giving.

We warmly welcome our new donors and extend our heartfelt thanks to our ongoing supporters and wider community. We feel privileged to work alongside our donors to ensure their philanthropic needs and wishes are met, and we love hearing their personal stories and discovering the reasons behind their support for the causes they care about.

As of June 30, 2024, our endowment funds have grown to \$6.37M, up from \$3.45M in 2023, thanks to new donor funds, bequests and trust transfers. The growth in donor funds and future bequests reflects the philanthropic spirit of our region and the strong relationships we are building, allowing us to provide greater funding and grants to deserving local groups.

Since our inception in 2015 and launch to the community in 2016, we are proud to have granted over \$1 million to local organisations in our region. This year alone, 130 grants totalling \$235,256 were distributed across our various funding streams.

Our team and governance have evolved. We express our gratitude to Bryce Barnett for his four years of dedicated service as Chair; he stepped down for health reasons but remains on the Board.

We welcomed Phil Hinton as our new Chair, along with new voluntary trustees Selwyn Metcalfe, Ainslee Luscombe and Aaron Foley. We extend our appreciation and gratitude to Mark Bowden and Loren Anderson for their valuable contributions as they stepped down from the Board.

Partnership is at the heart of our work, as we build connections to strengthen our region. We are proud to collaborate with a growing group of 20 Professional Advisors dedicated to growing local philanthropy. We value these strong connections and enjoy working closely with them.

Finally, the landmark project Destination Play at Kāwaroa has received outstanding community support, with Stage One on track to open by Christmas 2024 - a wonderful gift for our community! This project has been an incredible partnership between Ngāti Te Whiti, NPDC, NP Partners and key funders Toi Foundation and NZCT. Destination Play would not have been possible without the generous contributions from a wide range of supporters, including public, private, corporate and philanthropic donations, along with in-kind assistance.

To our team, trustees, committee members, funders, supporters, donors, and advocates, thank you for your continued support of the Taranaki Foundation. Together, we have the power to create lasting change and make a difference in the lives of those around us—today, tomorrow, and for future generations.

A personal legacy

JANINE EVANS MARKS A SPECIAL BIRTHDAY BY CREATING A LEGACY COMMUNITY GIFT

Janine Evans decided to mark her 65th birthday by creating a personal legacy for the community through the Taranaki Foundation.

"Even a small part of what you leave behind can make a big difference. Charitable giving isn't just for the wealthy. It's very cool to know I can continue supporting causes I care about, even after I've gone."

Janine's light bulb moment came at an event where she heard Taranaki Foundation CE, Josh Hickford, speak about the 10% rule: leaving 90% of your estate to your family and 10% to the community. For Janine, this way of giving was a "no brainer."

Inspired by this idea and motivated by a recent health scare, Janine engaged with her lawyer to include a charitable gift in her Will. This gift will be invested and grown to provide ongoing funding back to the community for years to come.

Janine attributes her strong sense of community giving to her parents, Gwen and John Wills, who instilled this value in her from a young age. Janine's legacy gift will eventually support child protection and the Govett-Brewster Charitable Foundation.

BUILDING A HEALTHIER FUTURE: THE TARANAKI HEALTH FUND

The Taranaki Health Fund, a new Community Fund established by the Taranaki Health Foundation, aims to significantly benefit local healthcare, and allow the region to have a long-term fund to provide healthcare enhancements as and when they are needed.

Adrian Sole, General Manager, explains, "Most hospital budgets focus on staffing and operations. The Taranaki Health Fund helps fill the gaps for new equipment and technology. Donations are managed and invested by the Taranaki Foundation, ensuring the capital is preserved forever. This offers individuals and families a meaningful way to contribute, including through bequests in Wills."

The Taranaki Health Fund provides an opportunity for individuals or families to select an area of healthcare to which they would like to financially contribute. The funds invested are pooled together and grown, and the annual income from the Fund will look to support enhancements like medical equipment upgrades and services in Paediatrics, Mental Health, Aged Care, and Cancer Care.

"This fund will help us meet future healthcare needs for everyone in our community," he adds.



The partnership between the Taranaki Health Foundation and the Taranaki Foundation highlights the strength of charitable organisations working together.

Stories of Impact

Turning Intent into Impact – Giving Stories

While capturing the complete impact of a year's worth of work is a monumental task, we are pleased to share a few highlights from the past year through the following three stories.

Marfell Community Trust

In 2023, Marfell Community Trust launched the Garden to Table Programme (GTT) with support of a \$3,500 grant from our annual funding cycle. This grant went towards funding a Garden Specialist / GTT Coordinator to enhance learning and engagement, maintain garden growth, and establish the GTT food education programme.

The initiative has successfully transformed the school garden into a productive, functional, and attractive learning space, positively impacting the Marfell School community.

Weekly 90-minute sessions split tamariki into two groups: one gardens while the other cooks the harvested produce. This year, 40 children participated, sharing meals together and gaining valuable skills through growing food and cooking healthy meals.

The GTT Coordinator has also developed a learning programme for teachers to use alongside garden visits. Teachers appreciate how the programme incorporates literacy and numeracy skills, such as reading recipes and measuring plant spacings.

Students, especially those who struggle in traditional classrooms, thrive in this hands-on, outdoor environment.

Sara Matheson, Garden Specialist / GTT Coordinator, said, "We really appreciate your support in helping us get the programme up and running. It has been a hit with the kids, and the learning opportunities are fantastic."



Hāwera Riding for Disabled

In 2023, Hāwera Riding for the Disabled (RDA) received a \$3,000 grant from the Harvey Symes Fund during our annual funding cycle.

Hāwera RDA is a volunteer organisation dedicated to providing horse riding therapy. Their mission is to use interactions with horses to enhance health and wellbeing for individuals of all ages living with disabilities, including physical, social, and neurological conditions. They work closely with schools, education, and health experts through a goal-based programme.

Over the years, Hāwera RDA has made significant progress, transitioning from a straw bale mount to a dedicated mounting ramp, from using horse floats instead of

riding horses, and increasing awareness about disabilities while training volunteers and coaches.

Lorraine Wilkie, Lead Facilitator, expressed her gratitude, stating,

“Thank you for your grant to help us care for our ponies. They are essential for the RDA to operate and must be in the best possible health.”

Beverley Prankerd, Secretary, added, “Ultimately, seeing a rider become confident, animated, and happy when riding is what makes it all worthwhile.”

Big Brothers Big Sisters

Since 2007, Big Brothers Big Sisters Taranaki has been connecting tamariki aged 6 to 10 with dedicated volunteer mentors. Over the years, more than 600 young people have been matched with caring, positive role models who commit to spending one hour a week with their 'Little.' Hangouts may include things like going for a bike ride, walking the dog, baking, kicking a ball at the local park or playing cards - but for that one hour, the young person has the undivided attention and care of their 'Big.'

In the 2023 funding round, BBBS Taranaki received a \$2,000 grant from The Tindall Foundation. This funding went towards supporting extracurricular activities like sports, kapa haka, and art—opportunities that Littles might not otherwise have the financial means to participate in. Paul Lampe, Programme Director, said,

“Thanks to The Tindall Foundation, we're able to sometimes support opportunities for our Littles that extend beyond their weekly meetups with their Bigs. Participating in extracurricular activities often provides a young person with a self-esteem boost and builds confidence. These moments are more than just fun—they're helping to foster new interests and personal growth.”

This is the power of the BBBS programme—forming trusting connections with a caring adult, that inspire growth and ignite youth potential, one match at a time.

THE TINDALL FOUNDATION

We couldn't talk about Whanaungatanga in our opening letter without highlighting the strengthened partnership between the Taranaki Foundation and The Tindall Foundation (TTF). This relationship, ongoing since 2018, took a significant step forward last year as the Taranaki Foundation transitioned from acting in an advisory role to them to joining their family of Local Donation Manager (LDM) partners around the country, now overseeing the annual distribution of funds. This new role allows us to engage more deeply with the community and ensures that funding supports Whānau/Family initiatives driving positive, community-led change.

For nearly 15 years, TTF’s funding has empowered grassroots groups in our region, addressing local needs and improving overall well-being. A notable highlight was

TTF’s additional \$25,000 allocation during the COVID-19 crisis, supporting essential services like Kai Kitchen, Hawera Budget Service, and New Plymouth Emergency Shelter Trust. Additionally, over the years TTF funding has supported a wide variety of impactful initiatives in our region, such as the New Plymouth MenzShed, Taranaki Women’s Refuge’s Aspire Men’s Programme, and Blue Light’s Te Ara Tika programme just to name a few.

On behalf of Taranaki, thank you to The Tindall Foundation. We truly are stronger together.

Community Project

Destination Play at Kāwaroa

A CREATIVE, INTERACTIVE, INTERGENERATIONAL SPACE FILLED WITH FUN

Destination Play at Kāwaroa is a collaborative project led by the Taranaki Foundation alongside mana whenua of Ngāmotu, Ngāti Te Whiti, the New Plymouth District Council and NP Partners. The development of Destination Play has brought together talents from every corner of the region. From design to construction to storytelling, many hands have contributed to its creation.

The vision for the space focuses on celebrating the connection between land and sea, designing for all generations, and reflecting the rich culture and heritage of the region. The goal is to create a welcoming, free space where families of all ages can gather and connect.

Stage One is progressing on schedule and within budget, thanks to the hard work of the project team, Cleland's and all of their subcontractors—many of whom are NP Partners.

We expect to open Stage One of Destination Play at Kāwaroa before Christmas - a wonderful gift for our community!

Stage Two is set to follow soon after Stage One opening, with fundraising for the remaining funds required being actively pursued across our community.
